

# **Writing a Strong Thesis Statement**

#### What is a thesis statement?

"The thesis statement is similar to the topic sentence in that it expresses an attitude, opinion, or idea about a topic; however, the thesis statement is broader and presents the controlling idea for the entire essay. In fact, each developmental paragraph should have a topic sentence and a controlling idea that echoes or relates to the controlling idea in the thesis statement" (Smalley et al., 2012).

# Points to Remember When Writing a Thesis Statement

- 1. It should be clear and specific.
- **2.** It should be a complete sentence.

### **Examples**

**Not a thesis statement:** My fear of the dark. (This is incomplete statement/a fragment)

A thesis statement: My fear of the dark has made my life miserable.

- 3. It should not be written as a question.
- 4. Do not announce the topic in your thesis statement. It should include an opinion, attitude, or idea.

#### **Examples**

Not a thesis statement: I am going to discuss the effects of radiation. (This is announcement of topic)

A thesis statement: The effects of radiation are often unpredictable.

**5.** Avoid expressing facts in a thesis statement. Instead, include an opinion that someone could agree or disagree with. Remember that you will explain or prove your opinion in the body of your essay.

### **Examples**

**Not a thesis statement:** Cows produces milk. (This is a fact)

A thesis statement: The milk cows produce is not always fit for human consumption.

**6.** Focus on one idea only in your thesis statement to maintain unity and coherence in your essay.

#### **Examples**

**Not a thesis statement:** Going to college in the Midwest is fun, and I have found that living in a Suburb is the best way to live while at college. (It expresses more than one idea)

A thesis statement: Going to college in the Midwest can be fun.

7. It is recommended to place the thesis statement at the end of the introductory paragraph.
